

Ashland Ward frequently hosts out-of-state visitors who attend classes at Ashland University, but now we have a lovely visitor all the way from Nigeria in West Africa, Tessy Omotidono Eguko. She explains that most people have two first names, their English name and their Nigerian name. Omotidono means joy and wealth. Names with meanings are a significant tradition in her native land.

While Sister Eguko gave us many facts about Nigeria, the most surprising is the range of temperatures: from 58.8° to 82.4°F. Last autumn, Tessy brought a lightweight jacket from Nigeria, never expecting snow and freezing temperatures in Northern Ohio. Needless to say, we assisted her in finding a warm coat right away.

Tessy, who will turn 25 on December 1, lives with her parents and three brothers when she is in Africa. She explained that girls stay with their families until they get married or go away to attend school. Even when they have jobs, they are not encouraged to live on their own. Tessy is earning her MBA in Human Resource Management, and her hope is to find a position with a large reputable company or become a college teacher. She also hopes to marry and have twelve children.

Sister Eguko hosted a dinner for several sisters prior to the Women's Conference on September 23rd. She served Jollof rice from her native land, explaining that this is an important traditional dish for entertaining. A gathering without Jollof rice is just a meeting; with it, it's a party. She also served bean cakes with a small piece of corn beef in the center; chin chin, a shortbread snack popular in Western Africa; and fried plantain. Everything was delicious!
